N.S.W. Japanese School Inc. was established in the inner-west area of Sydney as a not-for-profit community language school (belongs to the NSW Federation of Community Language Schools) with the objective of providing an environment where children learn and enjoy the Japanese language and culture. It mainly serves families where one or both parents are of Japanese background. Classes for pre-school and primary school-aged children are conducted on Saturday mornings from 9:30am to 12:15pm during regular school terms, generally 9 times per term.

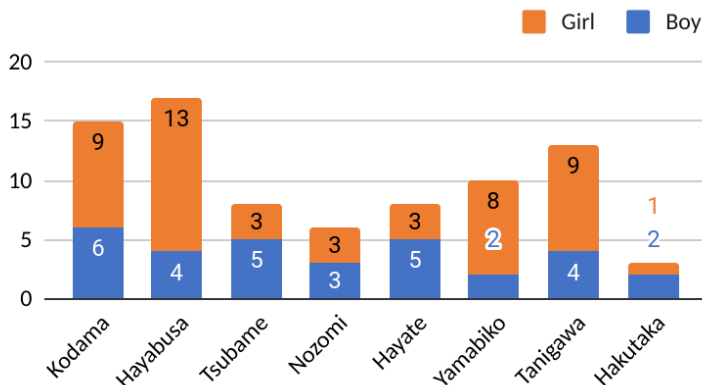
When N.S.W. Japanese School Inc. commenced in 2004, there were 6 classes and a total of 69 students ranging from 3 years old to 12 years old. The staff at that time were 6 teachers and 3 aides to the teachers. The school has 80 students and 8 classes as of July 2022. We changed the minimum age of student over 3 years and 6 months for 2022 enrollment since our new facility could be harder for small children.

School management committee

The school is run by directors, administration managers and treasurers who are selected from parents/ guardians of volunteers.

Parent/guardian class representatives are selected for each class and conduct volunteer work such as school events, library setting or fundraising with other volunteer class members under the supervision of the school management committee.

Families who do not wish to or are unable to participate in any kind of volunteer work are required to pay "Volunteer Exemption Fee" at the beginning of the year.

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Teaching Program

The students are divided into classes according to their age and Japanese proficiency regardless of their nationality. Lessons are conducted in Japanese and students are encouraged to speak Japanese while at school.

Classes focus on the four language skills - reading, writing, listening and speaking- while incorporating traditional seasonal events to pass on Japanese culture. Teachers are required to design an annual teaching plan for their class, and they conduct lessons accordingly to their plans each week/term.

Hina-matsuri (Japanese dolls festival)

Students make hina dolls to celebrate Hina-matsuri which is held on 3 March. Student crafts are displayed outside classrooms.

Tanabata-matsuri (Japanese star festival)

Tanabata-matsuri is celebrated at the end of term 2. Students write wishes onto tanzaku (strips of paper) and decorate them on bamboo branches.

Undou-kai (Sports carnival)

All students are divided into the red team or white team. Various events are held such as sprints, novelty races, and team competition of little bean bag throwing to baskets. After move to APS we haven't have chance to hold one yet but we are planning to hold a small sport day in the school hall.

Gakushu Happyou-kai (student performance)

Students perform songs, dance and drama etc

Natsu-matsuri (Summer festival)

This event is held after Closing ceremony of Term 4 and enjoyed by children and adults alike. Various activities are held such as yoyo-tsuri (yoyo-fishing), wanage (ring throwing). There are food stalls as well.

In addition to the above events, the school holds fundraising events such as selling Class photo, Japanese Readathon, Japanese style bread store and garage sales.

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Income and Expenditure

School income is generated from enrolment fees, tuition fees, annual membership fees, a New South Wales Government grant (NSW Community Languages Schools Program), fundraising, donation and bank account interest.

School expenditure includes wages, educational materials, school equipment, administration, storage fee, public liability insurance, Fair Trading fee, advertising and others.

The school treasurers report on the yearly budget and income and expenditure of the previous year at the annual general meeting which is held in the second week of term 1.

Since 2017 the school has also invested more time into fundraising aimed at financial stability. The fund is utilised to enrich a variety of events that are held every term. As part of fundraising, the school has organised a Read-a-Thon event, among others.
